
Philemon 15-22

¹⁹ I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand. I will pay it back—not to mention that you owe me your very self.



Recall from Colossians 1:21

Epaphrus was a spiritual leader devoted to prayer and responsible for bringing the gospel to Colossae

A resident of Colossae with "great zeal for the brethren in Laodicea and Hierapolis" (Col 4:12–13)...

... he has apparently come to Paul amidst his imprisonment. Perhaps Paul's letter was written in response to Epaphras' update on the church there, to expose and stop false teaching(s) and to encourage the church in their new Christian faith. 23 Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends you greetings.

²⁴ And so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas and Luke, my fellow workers.

Colossians 4

¹⁰ My fellow prisoner Aristarchus sends you his greetings, as does Mark, the cousin of Barnabas. (You have received instructions about him: if he comes to you, velocome him, ¹¹ Jesus, who is called Justus, also sends greetings. These are the only Jews^{IdI} among my co-workers for the kingdom of God, and they have proved a comfort to me. ¹² Epaphras, who is one of you and a servant of Christ Lexus, sends greetings. He is always wrestling in prayer for you, that you may stand firm in all the will of God, mature and fully assured. ^{B1} youch for him that he is working hard for you and for those at Laodicea and Hierapolis. ¹⁴ Our dear friend Luke, the doctor, and Demas send greetings. ¹⁵ Give my greetings to the brothers and sisters at Laodicea, and to Nymph and the church in her house.
